

GOSPEL

MK 1:1-8

The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God.

As it is written in Isaiah the prophet:

Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you;

he will prepare your way.

A voice of one crying out in the desert:

"Prepare the way of the Lord,

make straight his paths."

John the Baptist appeared in the desert

proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

People of the whole Judean countryside

and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem

were going out to him

and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River

as they acknowledged their sins.

John was clothed in camel's hair,

with a leather belt around his waist.

He fed on locusts and wild honey.

And this is what he proclaimed:

"One mightier than I is coming after me.

I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals.

I have baptized you with water;

he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

We like to think we are totally free, but the bitter truth is we simply are not. Or better put, our freedom is limited on every side — by governments, corporate giants, physical and mental frailties, genetic shortcomings, and even the boundaries of time and space, and above all, the burden of our sins and pending deaths. In our day, we are perhaps particularly aware that we are not free to disconnect from the technocratic rulers of the air. If you doubt me, try not paying your internet bill and see what happens. We are not totally free.

It's nothing new, of course. In Jesus' day, everyone felt the crushing weight of the Roman Empire. You can say you're free all you want. But try not paying your taxes to Rome and see what happens.

Once we feel this burden in our own lives — however it comes — we are ready to hear the stunning announcement that commences Mark's gospel, "The beginning of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." It's not a simple perfunctory introduction, but a dramatic announcement of new freedom. The word "gospel" was a political, even military, term. It meant: a great victory has been won and a new king is in charge. This Jesus — not the Roman emperor — is God's son, and he has defeated all that crushes human freedom. It's time to follow him and be truly free. This week let's refuse to submit our freedom to false rulers — especially that of sin. And let's rejoice that Christ is coming to make us perfectly free from all our oppressors.

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

What we are expecting radically affects how we prepare. A couple expecting a new baby, for example, prepares a Nursery. A family expecting to go on vacation prepares reservations, clothing, the car. A child expecting the first day of school prepares pencils, notebooks, backpack. The preparation matches the expectation. No matter what our preparation, however, the coming of the Lord always exceeds our expectation.

John the Baptist is telling the people that the One who is coming will exceed their expectation. He will be mightier than John because he will Baptize with the Holy Spirit; his coming will initiate unprecedented life-transforming change.

During this Advent are we primarily preparing ourselves for life-transforming change or merely preparing to celebrate a secular Christmas? What are our expectations? How does John the Baptist challenge us with a new set of expectations? Who helps us listen to John and respond? What prepares us to open ourselves to respond more fully to the Spirit with whom we have been baptized? Do our responses show that we know our expectations will be exceeded? What really prepares us for the changes the coming of the Lord will bring into our lives?

Taizé prayer is a meditative form of prayer. Through the repetition of musical phrases over and over, the body and mind slow down enough to be able to listen to the voice of God that is planted deep within you. Taizé prayer is traditionally held in a darkened church lit by candles. One aspect of the prayer involves icons, pictures painted by artists while in prayer, role models of greatness the church has highlighted for centuries. We see icons of Jesus, Mary, the prophets, and the saints displayed during Taizé prayer, but it is important to note that we do not worship these icons. They are merely reminders to us that we can shape our lives to reflect the sacred majesty of God. They speak to us of dying and rising in our daily lives through their living example.




Symbols and traditions of Advent

Have you ever wondered why certain things are displayed during Advent? Why certain songs are sung? Where some of the traditions you celebrate come from? When you understand the meaning behind our symbols and rich traditions, they become personal to you in a special way. One example may be the Jesse Tree. It's an old Christmas tradition that first began in medieval times. The earliest known representation of the Jesse Tree can be firmly dated to 1086. Our world is filled with so many voices vying for our attention. The season of Advent offers us voices as well. Advent's flow is one of joyful expectation on two counts: the recollection of the coming of Jesus in time and his return at the end. What do these voices say to us? Do we even hear them?
