

## **Third Sunday of Advent**

#### **FIRST READING** Is 61:1-2A, 10-11

The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners, to announce a year of favor from the LORD and a day of vindication by our God.

I rejoice heartily in the LORD, in my God is the joy of my soul; for he has clothed me with a robe of salvation and wrapped me in a mantle of justice, like a bridegroom adorned with a diadem, like a bride bedecked with her jewels. As the earth brings forth its plants, and a garden makes its growth spring up, so will the Lord GOD make justice and praise spring up before all the nations.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM** Lk 1:46-48, 49-50, 53-54

#### My soul rejoices in my God.

#### GOSPEL Jn 1:6-8, 19-28

A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He was not the light,

but came to testify to the light.

And this is the testimony of John.
When the Jews from Jerusalem sent priests
and Levites to him to ask him, "Who are you?"
He admitted and did not deny it,
but admitted, "I am not the Christ."
So they asked him,

"What are you then? Are you Elijah?"

And he said, "I am not."

"Are you the Prophet?"

He answered, "No."

So they said to him,

"Who are you, so we can give an answer to those who sent us?

What do you have to say for yourself?" He said:

"I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'make straight the way of the Lord,'" as Isaiah the prophet said."

Some Pharisees were also sent. They asked him, "Why then do you baptize

if you are not the Christ or Elijah or the Prophet?"
John answered them, "I baptize with water;

but there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me,

whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie." This happened in Bethany across the Jordan,

where John was baptizing.

#### **SECOND READING**

1 Thes 5:16-24

Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks,

for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus.

Do not guench the Spirit.

Do not despise prophetic utterances.

Test everything; retain what is good.

Refrain from every kind of evil.

May the God of peace make you perfectly holy and may you entirely, spirit, soul, and body, be preserved blameless for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The one who calls you is faithful, and he will also accomplish it.

Why do we believe in Jesus and the Catholic Church? Why should we continue to do so? We've never seen him face-to-face (at least not most of us, I assume). Most of us have never had mystical visions of angels or saints. We live in the same world as our atheist and secularists friends. Why do we believe in Christ if we've never seen him?

The simple, symbolic answer the Gospel presents to us this week might surprise us: we believe because of John the Baptist. Early in John's Gospel we hear: "There was a man sent from God, his name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him." The Baptist powerfully announces Jesus. This is a historical fact, and it is also now a pattern at work in our lives.

John the Baptist stands for the entirety of the old covenant, everything entrusted to the Jewish people. And yet he prophetically opens the door to something entirely new in Jesus, to the revival and fulfillment of God's promises. In every generation, and in every human life, God continues to do this. He has done it through people named Augustine, Francis, Catherine, Theresa, and countless others. In my life, the Baptist's spirit has come through persons named Eric, Paul, Mary, and Ron. I challenge you to name at least three people through whom God has announced the coming of Jesus in your life. Consciously thank God for their testimony. And let's commit ourselves to listening to the spirit of John the Baptist testify again this week so that we might more strongly believe in the light.



How is Christ in our midst, right here, right now, and we do not recognize him?



#### **CHRISTMAS WAFERS / "OPLATKI"**

In many homes throughout the world, a most beloved family tradition is the breaking of the "Oplatek" on Christmas Eve. The Oplatek is a thin wafer similar in consistency to a communion host that is often stamped with an elaborate Christmas scene. Historically, these would be distributed by religious to parishioners' homes during the Advent Season. The Oplatek is meant to remind families of the Eucharistic bread at Mass and makes a further connection between Christmas and the gift of the Eucharist, the presence of God among us. On Christmas Eve, the family eagerly awaits the first star in the night sky, recalling the star of Bethlehem that signaled the birth of the Savior. Once the star has been spotted, the Christmas Eve meal begins. The father, or eldest member of the family, begins the ceremony by taking the Oplatek and breaking a piece off to give to another. When he does so, he may say what he is thankful for, wish good health, or ask for forgiveness. After this initial sharing, the Oplatek is then shared with each member of the family in a similar manner. It is a touching ceremony, one that can help heal hurts from the past year. It is a beautiful tradition, one that keeps the true "Spirit of Christmas," and unites a family to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. \*\*\* Oplatki Christmas Wafers are available in a basket near the Baptismal Font in our Church. #### The "O Antiphons" of Advent

Think of your favorite Christmas song? What does that song share about the season? Our Church has special prayers that are sung during the 8 days that lead up to Christmas. They call to mind the different titles given to the Messiah. These prayers are called O Antiphons: O Wisdom of our God most High, O Leader of the House of Israel, O Root of Jesse, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, O Emmanuel.

"The Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the eighth century. They are the antiphons that accompany the Magnificat canticle of Evening Prayer from December 17-23. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but

present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah." USCCB

**Faith Challenge:** In the days leading to Christmas, from Dec. 17<sup>th</sup> through December 23<sup>rd</sup> pray and reflect on the O Antiphons. You will find reference to each in the book of **Isaiah**: 11:2-3; 11:4-5; 11:10; 22:22; 9:1; 9:5; 7:14. You may also choose to listen to the song, O Come Emmanuel and meditate on the words as you listen.

## **Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary**

#### **ADVENT CANDLES**

As the commercial world is already saturated with red and green, it's easy to lose sight of the true colors of the season—the Advent season. This week the color pink represents joy. It turns out, the Church has a good reason for putting one pink candle in the Advent wreath.

To discover the story of the pink candle, we first have to look at the origins of the season and the wreath. Until Advent was instituted toward the end of the fifth century, the only season Christians observed was Lent. As preparation for Christmas, the Church established Advent in the spirit of Lent–as a season of reflection and penance.

#### A wreath of hope

The custom of the Advent wreath originated with pre-Christian Germanic peoples whose evergreen wreaths and fires signified hope in the darkness of December. Christians maintained the tradition and by the 16th century German Catholics and Protestants used the wreath to symbolize hope for Christ's coming. The practice spread through the Christian world.

By one interpretation, the wreath's four candles represent the first Advent before Christ's birth, with each week commemorating 1,000 years from Adam and Eve until the Nativity. Purple candles stand for prayer, penance, and sacrifices and good works done during the Advent season, as we also wait for the Lord's second coming.
